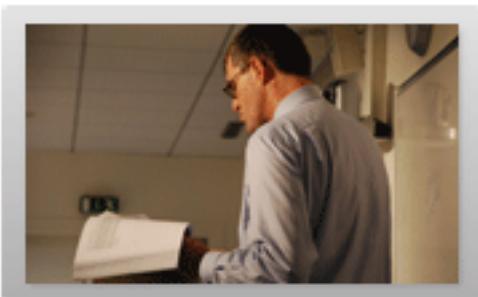
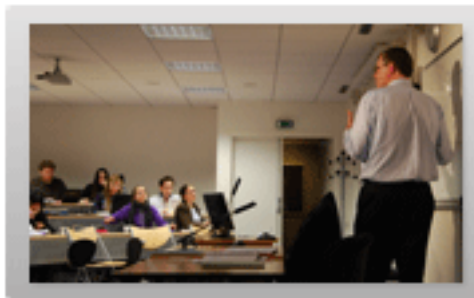

Program objectives

The courses in this Master are introduced on a gradual basis allowing students with no prior legal knowledge before commencing the program to master the essential techniques and methods of reasoning. Courses initially focus on the most general concepts before moving on, in subsequent semesters, to increasingly specialized and concrete fields of law. The courses therefore aim to introduce the students to fundamental legal concepts while also helping them understand the theoretical challenges involved, and are supplemented by very concrete case studies illustrating the real practice of the law. This combination of fundamental understanding and specific practical skills is indeed the very basis of legal practice.



Main orientations and specific features

The first year is devoted to the core subjects essential for acquiring or reinforcing a solid grounding in law, and in the subjects essential to a good understanding of economic law. Alongside these mandatory courses, each semester students are offered electives to round out the program, all of which focus both on the particular subject matter and the method of reasoning specific to legal experts.

In the second year, students can choose between five specialized concentrations:

- Economic Disputes and Arbitration
- European Economic law
- Companies, Markets and Regulation
- Global Studies

- Intellectual Property

These courses are taught either in French or in English by academics or practitioners.

Since the 2010-2011 academic year, the School of Law has offered non-French-speaking students an English Track from the first year of the Master in economic law through to the last year of the doctorate.

In the first year of the Master, all the mandatory courses are taught in French or in English. The same applies for some of the electives.

During the year off – or during the second year of coursework for students in the Companies, Markets and Regulation, Global Studies, and Intellectual Property Programs – students may take advantage of one of the many exchange agreements the Law School has concluded with prestigious universities around the world (including Columbia, Frankfurt, Harvard, Keio, McGill, and Turin)

Students in the English Track may be able to choose the speciality Global Studies more particularly oriented towards economic globalization.

Lastly, doctoral students may fulfil their prerequisites in English and draft their thesis in English.

Career openings

Graduates of this Master in Economic Law may move on to national or international careers primarily in law firms, consulting firms and the legal departments of major companies, but also in European or international institutions, whether governmental or non-governmental.
